

PALM SUNDAY A SAVIOR WHO CHOSE US

"Tm not very big...But I think I can. I think I can. I think I can." – The Little Blue Engine

Within the simple affirmation of "I think I can, I think I can," from "The Little Engine That Could," lies a profound lesson on the power of perseverance, belief, and the realization of destiny. This mantra eloquently articulates the journey of transcending one's apparent limitations—be it size, stature, or societal status—to achieve a grand purpose. The Little Engine That Could, written by Watty Piper, "...is a classic tale of the little engine that, despite her size, triumphantly pulls a train of wonderful things to the children waiting on the other side of a mountain." Although one could argue that the engine's tale is one about self-efficacy or positive thinking, upon deeper inspection it's possible to see a different theme like when ordinary potential meets purpose extraordinary things occur.

The Little Engine, modest in size and untested in her capabilities, had never faced the daunting challenge of crossing a mountain. Similarly, the colt, far from the majesty of a horse, might have seemed an unlikely candidate for a role of carrying the Messiah. Yet, it was this humble creature that was chosen to carry Jesus into Jerusalem for His triumphant entry. Together, these narratives teach us that true potential and purpose are not constrained by our perceived inadequacies or limitations; indeed, they often emerge from the most unassuming beginnings.

Imagine now a humble colt, tied, unused, seemingly inconsequential in the bustling life of the city. Yet, this creature was earmarked for a purpose far beyond its own comprehension, awaited by the Master Himself. Jesus, in need of the colt, declared in Luke 19:31, "The Master has need of it," signifying that even the most unremarkable among us are essential to the unfolding of His divine plan.

HOLY MONDAY A SAVIOR WHO WELCOMES US BACK

"Peter gave himself up for lost and shed big tears" – Peter Rabbit

"Peter gave himself up for lost and shed big tears," marks a poignant moment in Beatrix Potter's "The Tale of Peter Rabbit." Here, Peter, a young rabbit who defied his mother's warnings, finds himself in peril within Mr. McGregor's garden. This garden, brimming with forbidden allure, becomes a landscape of both adventure and misfortune. Peter's tears signify a character arc, a revelation of his vulnerability away from the safety and love drive his decision to return home.

This tender scene mirrors the biblical narrative of the Prodigal Son, who, after squandering his inheritance in a far-off land, faces his own moment of despair and returns to his right mind, Luke 15:17-20says, "How many of my father's hired servants have food to spare, and here I am starving to death! I will set out and go back to my father and say to him: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants.' So, he got up and went to his father." Unsure of the welcome that awaits him. Yet, what he finds is grace beyond measure—his father rushing to embrace him, not with reproach, but with joy and celebration.

Both Peter Rabbit and the parable of The Prodigal Son traverse the themes of crossing boundaries, driven by rebellion. When we return to our Heavenly Father, his presence is our home, we will find love and forgiveness.

This Holy Monday, let their stories remind you that no

journey is too long, and no mistake too great, that it cannot be met with the loving forgiveness of a Savior eager for your return.

HOLY TUESDAY A SAVIOR WHO TRANSFORMS US

"It's no use going back to yesterday, because I was a different person then," - Alice's Adventures in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll

"It's no use going back to yesterday, because I was a different person then," muses Alice in Alice's Adventures in Wonderland. This musing is a reminder that we're constantly evolving, not just through the rabbit holes of our adventures but in the depth of our spiritual journey with Christ. The Bible declares, "When someone becomes a Christian, he becomes a brand-new person inside. He is not the same anymore. A new life has begun!" (2 Corinthians 5:17 TLB).

Not long ago, I stood with my family at the Equator, a line that divides the world into two hemispheres. There, we witnessed a fascinating demonstration: a water swirl that changed direction merely a step across this invisible line, due to the Coriolis effect. In one hemisphere, the water swirled clockwise; a step over, and it swirled counterclockwise. It was a vivid reminder of how a small change in position can lead to a completely different outcome.

This experience at the Equator serves as a metaphor for our spiritual transformation in Christ. Just as stepping across the Equator can change the direction of water's swirl, accepting Christ into our lives spins us into a new direction. We cross over from a life of sin and death into eternal life, our entire being transformed by His grace.

Embracing Christ doesn't exempt us from challenges; it transforms how we face them. A personal testament to this transformation is evident in my relationship with my spouse. Following an argument, where I instinctively dredged up past mistakes to fortify my position, I was met not with retaliation but with a calm, "That was the past. I am no longer that person anymore."

This response was a living testimony to the transformative power of faith. Instead of anger, there's prayer; instead of bitterness, forgiveness. It's a clear marker of how far we've come and a reminder that we're still growing. Like Alice, if you sense a change in you embrace it. If you notice that you are outgrowing certain mindsets and behaviors, embrace it. Also, if you are beginning to sense a nudging to pivot in the way you handle people or situations, embrace it. It's a sign of the work Christ is doing in you.

For those feeling stuck or longing for change, know that transformation is within reach. It starts with repentance and unfolds as we immerse ourselves in God's Word, letting it reshape our thoughts, actions, and words. Each day is an opportunity to live out this transformation, trusting in the slow but sure work of grace.

This Holy Tuesday let's reflect on our journeys of change. Like Alice's adventures and the visible transformation in my spouse, we're reminded that our past doesn't define us. In Christ, we are made new, continually evolving and embracing the future He has for us with open arms.

Prayer:

ASAVIOR WHO REDEEMS OUR STORY

"Real isn't how you are made,' said the Skin Horse. 'It's a thing that happens to you..." – Skin Horse, The Velveteen Rabbit.

In the tender narrative of The Velveteen Rabbit by Margery Williams, a toy rabbit becomes 'Real' through the love of his owner. This journey of transformation, from a mere object of play to a beloved, living companion, serves as a poignant metaphor for our spiritual renewal during Lent. His transformation was a testament to the power of persistent love, and surprisingly, I found myself transformed in the process. No longer was I merely practicing religion; I was living out the love of Christ. It was a poignant reminder that transformation is often a mutual journey, where in loving others, we too are made anew.

The Velveteen Rabbit narrative, some parts, reflect some aspects of my transformation and gracefully unfolds the essence of Ash Wednesday and our Lenten passage, reminding us that our walk with the Lord is not one of instantaneous change but of gradual transformation through the profound love of Christ.

As we enter the solemnity of Ash Wednesday, we are beckoned to traverse our spiritual terrains, pondering deeply: What constitutes our 'realness'? MAUNDY THURSDAY A SAVIOR'S LOVE

"The most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or touched, they are felt with the heart," – The Little Prince" by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry

In the tender narrative of The Little Prince by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, we're introduced to a young prince on a quest for wisdom. GOOD FRIDAY A SAVIOR SUFFERING IN OUR PLACE

"You have been my friend," replied Charlotte. "That in itself is a tremendous thing." – Charlotte's Web by E.B. White

In Charlotte's Web, a story cherished for its themes of friendship, sacrifice, and redemption, we meet Charlotte, a wise and caring spider who forms an unlikely bond with Wilbur, a young pig. Facing the threat of slaughter, Wilbur finds a friend in Charlotte, who weaves words into her web to save his life. Her efforts, though exhausting, signify the depth of her love and commitment. Her efforts are physically draining for her, as creating the webs and coming up with plans requires a significant amount of her energy and resources.

Charlotte's life cycle is also coming to an end, as spiders of her kind (a barn spider) live for about a year. She spends her last days at the fair, where she creates her final masterpiece in her web to save Wilbur. After completing her last web, which plays a crucial role in ensuring Wilbur's safety, Charlotte becomes very weak and explains to Wilbur that she won't be returning to the barn with him. She dies at the fairground, alone but at peace knowing that her friend Wilbur will live.

Ultimately, Charlotte act of love illustrates the essence of self-giving love. Upon close inspection we see a poignant narrative reflects the core message of Good Friday.

Today, we commemorate the ultimate sacrifice of Jesus Christ, who, like Charlotte, laid down His life out of profound love for His friends, for us. Through His crucifixion, a narrative of pain and betrayal transforms into a story of unparalleled love and sacrifice. The selfless act of Charlotte to save Wilbur echoes the sacrificial love Jesus demonstrated on the cross—a love so vast it encompasses all humanity.

HOLY SATURDAY A SAVIOR CULTIVATES IN SILENCE

"When the door was shut and locked, Mary wondered what was going to happen." - The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett

In The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett, we are introduced to Mary Lennox, a young, initially sour girl sent to live with her uncle in a large, lonely house on the moors. There, Mary discovers a locked, neglected garden. With the help of new friends, she begins to tend to the forgotten space. 'And the secret garden bloomed and bloomed, and every morning revealed new miracles.' The garden's transformation, from a desolate plot to a vibrant haven, becomes a powerful metaphor for healing, growth, and rebirth. This miraculous transformation mirrors the silent, mysterious work of Holy Saturday.

Beneath the soil of Mary's secret garden, seeds undergo a profound change in the dark, unseen by human eyes. This process of germination—a seed's transformation into a plant—is a quiet yet powerful force of nature. It begins in the obscurity of the earth, where warmth and moisture awaken the life within the seed, initiating growth that stretches toward the light, unseen until it breaks through the soil into visibility.

Similarly, Holy Saturday occupies a sacred space of waiting and unseen transformation. Fast from: *Unnecessary noise (creating spaces of silence)* **Focus:** *Waiting on God and trusting in His unseen work*

Scripture to Read: *Matthew* 27:57-66

Scripture to Meditate and Memorize: Psalm 46:10

Action item: Spend time in nature or in a quiet space, reflecting on the silent work of God in your life. **Prayer declaration:** "In the silence, God is at work within me, preparing me for His divine purpose." **Prayer Hours:** 6 AM (Prayer for trust in God's silent work), Noon (Silent reflection on our own spiritual growth), 6 PM (Evening prayer for the revelation of God's love at Easter).

RESURRECTION SUNDAY A SAVIOR ESTABLISHES KINGDOM

'Wrong will be right, when Aslan comes in sight, At the sound of his roar, sorrows will be no more, When he bares his teeth, winter meets its death, And when he shakes his mane, we shall have spring again."
The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis

In C.S. Lewis's The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, we are transported to the fictional land of Narnia, ensnared in perpetual winter by the White Witch's curse. The arrival of four children from our world coincides with the return of Aslan, the true king and a noble lion, whose presence heralds the demise of the witch's reign and the return of spring. Aslan's voluntary sacrifice to save Edmund, one of the children who betrayed him, and his subsequent resurrection, breathe new life into Narnia, freeing it from tyranny and despair.

The prophecy, "Wrong will be right, when Aslan comes in sight," speaks to the transformative power of Aslan's return. It suggests that the injustices, suffering, and moral disorder imposed by the White Witch's rule will be corrected with Aslan's intervention. This line is deeply allegorical, with Aslan representing Christ. Just as Aslan's coming heralds justice, peace, and the restoration of Narnia, Christ's presence and sacrifice offer redemption, reconcile wrongs, and bring about the ultimate restoration in the lives of believers and the world at large, symbolizing the Christian belief in the rectification of injustices and the healing of all creation through Christ's redemptive work.

This narrative mirrors the triumphant essence of Easter Sunday, where we celebrate not just the return of spring but the resurrection of Jesus, the true King who conquers death and ushers in eternal life. In Narnia, as the grip of the White Witch's winter melts away with Aslan's return, symbolizing the transformative power of Christ's resurrection, we too awaken to new life, to the reality of Jesus' victory over the grave.

"He is not here; for He has risen, just as He said" (Matthew 28:6). Today, the stone is rolled away, the tomb is empty, and the world is forever changed. Jesus' resurrection is the cornerstone of our faith, the definitive sign that life triumphs over death, love conquers hate, and hope is eternal.

As we celebrate Easter, let us also embrace the new life that Jesus offers us. The resurrection is not just an event to be remembered; it's a reality to be lived. In Christ, we are invited to experience a rebirth, a renewal of our hearts and minds, emerging from the winters of our discontent into the glorious spring of His saving love.

Prayer:

Risen Lord, on this glorious Easter Sunday, we rejoice in Your victory over death and the new life You grant us. Like Narnia's winter turned to spring by Aslan's roar, may our lives be transformed by the power of Your resurrection. Help us to live out this new life daily, embodying the hope and joy of Your victory in every word and deed. Amen.

This Easter, let the story of Aslan in The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe inspire us to see the resurrection of Jesus as the ultimate triumph, a promise of new life and hope that forever alters the landscape of our faith and our lives.
